

Waterways in Crisis

Government announces reduced funding for the Canal & River Trust

The Government funding agreement for the Canal & River Trust ends in four year's time. The current annual grant of £52.6 million a year represents about a quarter of the Trust's income, the rest coming mainly from user licences, mooring charges, income from land holdings and charitable donations. As the grant is fixed and does not increase with inflation, it is already causing financial problems for the Trust and we are already seeing indications of spending restraints despite increases in volunteers taking on many roles.

On 10th July 2023 the Government announced the funding for the next ten year period commencing in 2027. Although they accept that the Canal & River Trust has provided value for money since its takeover from the nationalised British Waterways in 2012 the Government states that the Trust should not need Government support and should seek other forms of funding. They have, therefore, said that the grant will be reduced to £50 million in 2027 and be cut by 5% each year after that. At the end of the period in 2037 the annual grant will have reduced to £31.5 million. In total this means that the Canal & River Trust will lose £320m. This comes as maintenance costs for ageing canal infrastructure – 200-year-old plus locks, aqueducts, reservoirs, embankments – is increasing due to climate change with more periods of drought and extreme storm events. Such a drastic decrease in funds will inevitably result in a decline in the overall condition of our waterway network, and, alarmingly, the possibility of canal closures. It puts at risk invaluable natural habitats, historic infrastructure and cherished public spaces.

The Trust believes that the substantial reduction in support will mean that maintenance will have to be cut back and there are likely to be canal closures. The Northern canals and navigations with their low number of boats and high maintenance costs are most at risk. As it stands we are facing an existential threat to the Huddersfield Narrow Canal.

Please write to your local MP telling them how much you care about the canals and why they need to be funded properly. Urge the Government to reconsider their decision and protect our waterways for the future.

And how can you do it?

Shuttle Boat Operations

We had our most successful season in 2022 with over 10,000 passengers on the two craft. 2023 is the second season in which we have operated both d(iesel) and e(lectric) Shuttles. The d-Shuttle did its customary run down to Stalybridge for the Festival weekend in late June, but this time paused at Uppermill on the return journey to gauge the viability of an occasional trip boat service there.

We have been surprised at the level of interest and, subject to our having sufficient volunteers to crew the boat, we aim to run

The trips last about 15 minutes from outside the Saddleworth Museum & Gallery.





New Slaithwaite moorings and update on operations

For many years the narrow road cum towpath between Lock 23E and Lock 24E at Slaithwaite had caused concern. The wash wall was unstable and temporary plastic barriers had been in place on the ramp up to the guillotine lock. The promised wash wall repairs, and mooring points have now materialised after a £5m project which ran over the winter months up to Easter 2023. It involved driving of a continuous sheet pile wall and removal of silt. You can see from the images that the work is to a high quality and incorporates many mooring rings. It's good to see this investment in our waterway.

Update on operations

Although last summer's drought is behind us, availability of through navigation has been hampered by planned and unplanned works. Most reservoirs were full after the winter rain but Hilltop at Slaithwaite has been held 1.5 metre below spillway level to permit repairs to the spillway which has impacted on water availability downstream.

The continuing challenges of maintaining water above Lock 1E in Huddersfield have been exacerbated by this and CRT have conducted further investigations to establish how water is being lost and plan more grouting of the Lock wall as a result. Until the leakage is fully resolved passage through Lock 1E is available at 9am and 2pm slots for either direction of travel Monday to Sunday but has to be booked.

In addition a series of emergency stoppages have had to be put in place on both east and west sides to deal with broken cills and failed lock equipment.

Standedge Tunnel & Visitor Centre changes

During the winter of 2022 we became aware of moves to market the warehouse building and cease to run weddings by October 2023. The weddings have been a good source of income for CRT over the last few years and concerns have been raised by CRT's own volunteers and your Society about the likely impact on this special site which is run at a net cost to CRT.

We have been assured that CRT is still committed to running the sole remaining trip boat into Standedge Tunnel but they have made us aware that there are no funds for replacing the 22 year old tug and passenger modules. Meanwhile it is understood that five businesses have expressed an interest in leasing the warehouse building and we await the outcome of CRT's deliberations. We hope to be able to report positive news in our next newsletter.
